IMPORTANT INFORMATION and PLANETARIUM ETIQUETTE

- ★ On-campus parking requires a LBCC parking permit (\$1.00 and available in machines located in the parking lots).
- ★ This event is FREE for CDC families, but donations to the Planetarium are optional and appreciated. Donation envelopes are available at the door for those who wish to make a donation to the LBCC Foundation, which provided most of the funds for the planetarium. There is no requirement that you make a donation; but if you choose to do so, please indicate account #1156 on your check or donation envelope to show that it was in connection with a Planetarium show.
- ★ Reserved seating starts about 6:15 p.m. Individuals without reservations may be seated at the same time, if there are unreserved seats. Reserved seating ends about 6:40 p.m., at which time anyone may enter, subject to seating availability.
- ★ During full-dome presentations, the Planetarium is completely darkened. As a result, there is no entry during Planetarium presentations. If necessary, you may leave the Planetarium, but you will not be able to return until the show is over. All cell phones and other devices which emit light must be turned off.
- ★ No food or drink is allowed in the Planetarium.
- ★ The best seating is inside the circular footprint of the dome, near the central aisle, but not so close to the Planetarium projector that it blocks your view. If you can comfortably view the top of the dome and the area above the operator's console, you should have a good view of the entire show.
- ★ No photography is allowed during presentations. The deliberate or inadvertent use of flash photography not only spoils the show for everyone else, but is completely pointless. All that a flash photograph shows is the blank white dome that is visible when the lights are on.
